Dear RTH Residents,

Do you know the RTH Mission Statement? I didn't. But as the new RTH Executive Director and a former RTH resident, I am seeing and feeling the power in our mission.

The RTH Mission: *"RTH seeks to develop, preserve and maintain safe and affordable housing for low and moderate income people of diverse backgrounds in the RTH/Mission Hill neighborhood and to improve the quality of life for its residents. We achieve this through property management, construction and rehabilitation of properties, provision of social and educational services, workforce development, and community activism. As one of the oldest grassroots, tenant organizations, we dedicate ourselves to defending the rights to quality, affordable housing for people of all races and cultures as well as promoting tenant empowerment through active tenant participation in leadership and development."*

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RESIDENT IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Tomeka Taylor has been a resident of RTH at Mission Park for three years and still considers herself a “newbie” to the community.

She is a single mom of two wonderful and energetic boys, David, age 11, and Jaiden, age 5.

Tomeka attended Urban College of Boston where she earned an Associate’s Degree in Early Childhood Education and an Associate’s Degree in Human Services. She worked with the City of Boston (Boston’s Youth and Family Services) for twelve years as a kindergarten teacher assigned to the Tobin Community Center. “I thoroughly enjoyed my work with the children and families in Mission Hill and was sad to leave. I was on the waiting list for housing at RTH nine years, but I felt this community and environment would be a good place for me to raise my two boys. And, it was worth the wait. I feel very comfortable living here.”

“My son David was diagnosed with Autism and ADHD when he was two and a half years old. When the doctor delivered the heartbreaking diagnosis, I left the office with a one page pamphlet that described autism as a complex developmental disability which affects a person’s ability to communicate and interact with others.”

“I experienced a wide array of emotions - shock, grief, fear, denial, anger, acceptance, and many more. I had to develop my own Autism 101 crash course. I spent a lot of time at the Parker Hill Library researching autism, and reading every book I could find that could bring me to a better understanding of autism and how to advocate in the schools, hospitals and housing – whatever it took to take care of my son.”

April is Autism Awareness Month. Research reports that 1 in 88 children in public schools is diagnosed with autism. “Fortunately more people are aware of this disability than they were 10 years ago when I began my journey.”

Although raising a child with autism presents many unique challenges, Tomeka has learned to live with the negative comments, insults, criticisms, insensitive comments, strange looks and stares without becoming stressed.

“I wish more people would become more informed about this disability, and show more compassion, sensitivity, acceptance and understanding.”

“I was very pleased to find several good books on autism in the Betty Powers Library, some written especially for children. I would really like to see more activities and opportunities at RTH geared toward children living with this disability. Special thanks to the staff at the BPLCLC for helping to shine a light on autism.”

NEW RTH HEALTH AND SAFETY MEETINGS

Formerly the RTH Security Meeting, the RTH Health & Safety Meeting will continue to meet on the 2nd Wednesday of each month from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. in the Parks Community Building. Sal DeMarco of Securitas and Officer Jerry Smart of the Boston Police Department will provide crime statistics, discuss neighborhood safety issues, and take resident's questions as before. Property Management representatives will also be on hand, and a third health focused section has been added.

Each month, the meeting will be hosted by a different RTH department head and a health topic of interest to RTH residents will be presented, followed by an opportunity for residents to ask questions, voice concerns, and make suggestions.

The inaugural meeting of the RTH Health & Safety Meeting was attended by over thirty RTH residents who learned about the bedbug epidemic in America and particularly in Boston. Lisa Moris, MSW, LISW, (who, coincidentally, did her internship here at RTH Resident Services Department a number of years ago) gave an in-depth presentation on the basics of recognizing signs of bedbugs, what steps to take to avoid an infestation, and the necessity of treating bedbugs on the community level, rather than as an individual household problem. If one unit has bedbugs, the surrounding units are at risk and should be inspected, too. Her main point was that having bedbugs is not an indication of poor housekeeping or unsanitary conditions. It can happen to anyone and it should not be a cause for shame or embarrassment. Do not ignore the signs. The bedbugs will not go away by themselves, may live for up to four years without feeding, and a female may lay up to 500 eggs a day! Do not dispose of infested furniture or clothing by setting out in the halls or at the curbside. Do not pick up furniture, clothing, or other items that have been placed out- you may be bringing unwanted guests into your home.

Copies of the presentation are available by request at the Resident Services office. If you suspect bedbugs, call facilities immediately for a free inspection.

Traffic issues were a focus of the safety section of the meeting. Charlie Fernandez, a Mission Park resident, brought a serious traffic safety concern to Officer Smart's attention. The timing of the light at the intersection of Parker Street and Huntington Avenue makes for very dangerous pedestrian crossings.

Beverly Moss, Technology Director, suggested that a "green left arrow" traffic light be installed on the traffic lights outside of the Mission Park Huntington Avenue entrance. This would allow all patrons traveling east on Huntington Avenue safe passage while entering Mission Park.

Residents would appreciate a visit to the RTH Health & Safety Meeting by a representative of the Boston traffic department and maybe Councillor Michael Ross, as well. Other residents complained that the handling of vehicles entering Mission Park needed to be addressed immediately. Traffic jams are occurring regularly at the main security booth. Why can't taxis, the RIDE, and other such vehicles be passed through without a prolonged stop at the booth which backs up traffic onto and down Huntington Avenue? Rita Arroyo, Old Neighborhood Residents Association President, asked that they be given the Old Neighborhood security tour reports as they had been in the past, to which Sal DeMarco readily agreed.

What does an RTH Board Director do?

The RTH Board of Directors oversees RTH financial resources, ensures there is sufficient funding for sustainability and desired growth, and ensures accountability to the RTH community. It engages in strategic planning and oversight implementation, ensures effective program development and evaluation, hires, supports and evaluates the executive director, ensures the legal and ethical integrity of the RTH organization, and works to enhance RTH's public image. It feels like the school year is flying by! We have been very busy over at the RTH After School Program (ASP). We recently acquired the old daycare space which we now call the **Recreation and Exploration Center (The REC)**. With this new space we can serve up to 50 children and provide more enriching activities.

The RTH After School Program provides a safe, fun place for school-aged children to work on homework, participate in exciting enrichment activities, and make new friends! Activities include homework assistance, literacy, computer classes, art projects, and science activities! We are pleased to have students from neighboring colleges to work with us as tutors and lead activities. Full day school vacation week programming is free of charge for enrolled students. There is a small fee for parents who want to sign their children for the December, February and April breaks.

SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

What is your child doing to stay active and engaged this summer? Come enjoy swimming, sports, art projects, science activities, and field trips throughout the Boston area with the RTH Summer Enrichment Program! The SEP is open to children ages 6 through 12. Enrollment preference is given to children who are residents of RTH. The RTH Summer Enrichment Program will run from July 8th - August 23rd and will cost \$150 per child. Applications will be available April 3rd @ The REC (835R Huntington Avenue). The program is open to children ages five through twelve who are currently enrolled in kindergarten through 5th grades, and are residents of RTH. The Summer Enrichment Program gives kids a chance to participate in fun learning activities in an atmosphere where respect, teamwork and a sense of community are valued.

ESOL

The goal of the ESOL classes at RTH is to help non-native speakers with their English proficiency to obtain jobs, advance in the workplace, and further engage in their community. Attendees of these classes tend to be parents who are juggling work with raising their family, that believe that acquiring more proficient language skills will better their livelihoods. Since these attendees are RTH residents, they feel that having classes offered by the community allows them the opportunity to manage their time while interacting with neighbors who share the same beliefs in the importance of language.

RTH offers Beginning ESOL class, English for the Workplace, Advanced ESOL, and an Idiomatic English Conversation Group.

The **Workplace Class** is using materials from the Asian American Civic Association(AACA), with the hopes that the curriculum will prepare them for the job trainings offered by AACA. This class has continued working on how to read newspaper advertisements, make appointments for interviews, and create resumes. We are also working on workplace- and daily life-related vocabulary, such as phrases needed in the emergency room or at the supermarket. Please note that RTH ESOL classes are open to all residents. These classes are conducted in English.

The **ESOL Advanced Class** also has a focus on workplace-related language skills, and the two classes share some of the curriculum; the Advanced Class also opens the possibility of pursuing a college degree.

The **Idiomatic English Conversation Group** provides a forum for advanced ESOL students to practice conversational skills and the use of idioms, always a challenge for those learning to speak English. So if you have been sitting on the fence about studying to improve your English skills, don't miss the boat!

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ELIGIBILITY TO RUN FOR THE RTH BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Must be a legal resident of an RTH property
- Must be 18 years or older
- Must be a voting member for at least 6 months
- May not be an employee of RTH *(An otherwise eligible employee must resign from his/her position before running for the board.)*

NUTRITION AND HEALTHY EATING PROGRAMS AT RTH

Share Our Strength, a national non-profit dedicated to ending childhood hunger in America, has developed a program called **Cooking Matters**, which teaches low income families at risk of hunger how to get more food for their money and better nourishment from those foods. Cooking Matters is presenting cooking workshops and food preparation demonstrations in the Flynn Kitchen that are geared towards seniors, families and kids, and teens. In December, a fully subscribed Cooking Matters workshop focused on making holiday foods healthier while still being tasty and festive. Currently, a six-session workshop series for seniors and adults is underway and a series for parents and children is being planned. We will also have workshops on adaptive recipes- making favorite dishes healthier- as many RTH residents have expressed concerns about diabetes, obesity, and high blood pressure.



Cooking Matters at the Store® is a guided grocery store tour to help families buy healthy, affordable foods. Participants learn and practice shopping skills such as buying fruits and vegetables on a budget, comparing unit prices, reading labels, and identifying whole grain foods. Our first tours were led by BU nutrition students, trained by the Share Our Strength organization, who led groups of RTH residents on tours through the local Stop and Shop. We now have our own trained facilitator, Dorothy Hurley, who has not only taken over leading the tours- four to date- but is collaborating with RTH community interpreters in order to include RTH residents with limited English language proficiency.



Food Dollars - Funded by AARP, facilitated by ABCD at RTH, this six-workshop series was designed to address specific dietary issues of African American seniors. The goal of Food Dollars is to increase access to healthy food and eating. Participants learn about the senior food pyramid and how to plan and prepare healthy low cost meals that are nutritious and easy to prepare; how to read unit prices, to use cost saving techniques when grocery shopping, food safety and available benefits. Each of the sixteen participants who attended five sessions received a Stop and Shop gift card to practice smart shopping techniques. The first RTH Food Dollars class created a cook book of tasty, healthy dishes that will be used in the Flynn Kitchen senior lunch program in the coming year.



Weight Watchers A fifteen-week pilot Weight Watchers program is underway at RTH. Participants meet once a week to weigh in, learn new strategies for losing weight and maintain a healthy weight, and to support each other's efforts. Each participant has committed to perform community service hours and to participate in an exercise program at RTH - *Walking Group, Yoga, Senior Fit, Ballroom Dancing,* etc- in addition to the weekly meeting.

FAMILY NURTURING PROGRAM

The RTH Family Nurturing Program, coordinated by Cherie Milton, meets weekly and is designed to build strong, healthy bonds between parents and their children. We utilize the Nurturing Parenting Program curriculum, which provides parents with effective behavior management tools and encourages the development of healthy parent-child relationships, so that families may face their unique challenges together.

Group discussions, interactive activities, and videos help increase parents' and childrens' understanding of program concepts. The classes are designed to strengthen families through education in empathy, discipline, responsibility, child development, healthy family roles, self-awareness, personal power, and positive behavior management

Families have begun interacting, socializing and supporting each other and giving positive feedback. Children are excited about the program and look forward to attending on Thursday nights. The children are learning about responsibility, behavior management and most important, learning to communicate with their parents. The families also gather together for meals, family nurturing time and family activities. The resident and staff facilitators, serving in the Family Nurturing Program, demonstrate commitment, dedication and enthusiasm working with the families, and each week they come prepared with fresh ideas for the week's topic.

We look forward to a great conclusion of the program on May 23rd with a big and memorable graduation party.
